FOOD STAMP PROGRAM CHANGES EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 2006

By law, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) adjusts the food stamp benefits annually on October 1. The maximum amount of food stamp benefits is as follows:

ONE-person household \$155FIVE-person household \$615TWO-person household \$284SIX-person household \$738THREE-person household \$408SEVEN-person household \$816FOUR-person household \$518EIGHTperson household \$932

For each additional household member over eight, add \$117 per month.

PLEASE NOTE

The above amounts are **maximums.** The amount of food stamps for which a household is eligible depends on household net income after allowable expenses.

USDA adjusts the income eligibility limits for food stamp benefits annually. Maximum net monthly income of a household of various sizes are as follows:

ONE	- person	household	\$817	FIVE	-	person	household	\$1950
TWO	- person	household	\$1100	SIX	-	person	household	\$2234
THREE	- person	household	\$1384	SEVEN	-	person	household	\$2517
FOUR	- person	household	\$1667	EIGHT	-	person	household	\$2800

For each additional household member, add \$284 per month.

DEDUCTIONS

• The standard deduction is:

\$134 with 1-3 household members \$139 with 4 household members \$162 with 5 household members \$186 with 6 or more household members

- The maximum deduction for dependent care is \$200 for any child under age 2 and \$175 for any child age 2 or older.
- The maximum deduction for high housing and utility expense is \$417.
- Households with elderly or disabled members may be eligible for additional deductions.
