

## Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Changes Effective October 1, 2023

By law, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) adjusts the income eligibility limits and SNAP benefits annually on October 1. Maximum gross and net monthly income of households of various sizes are as follows:

Household size	Gross monthly income	Net monthly income
1	\$1,580	\$1,215
2	\$2,137	\$1,644
3	\$2,694	\$2,072
4	\$3,250	\$2,500
5	\$3,807	\$2,929
6	\$4,364	\$3,357
7	\$4,921	\$3,785
8	\$5,478	\$4,214
Each additional member	+ \$557	+ \$429

The **maximum** amounts of SNAP benefits are listed below. The actual amount of SNAP for which a household is eligible depends on the household net income after allowable deductions.

Household size	Maximum monthly benefit
1	\$291
2	\$535
3	\$766
4	\$973
5	\$1,155
6	\$1,386
7	\$1,532
8	\$1,751
Each additional member	+\$219

### Deductions

- The standard deduction, which is deducted from all households' income, is:
  - \$198 with 1-3 household members
  - \$208 with 4 household members
  - \$244 with 5 household members
  - \$279 with 6 or more household members
- The maximum deduction for high housing and utility expense is \$672.
- The Homeless Standard Deduction is \$179.66 per month.
- Households with elderly or disabled members may be eligible for additional deductions.
- Households who pay court ordered child support are also eligible for an additional deduction.
- Households who pay dependent care expense may be eligible for an additional deduction.
